# **Public Works News and Updates**

**ZONES:** For purposes of trash, recycling, bulk collection, loose brush and leaf pick-up, the Township is divided into four quadrants or zones:

**LOOSE BRUSH** pick-up will be suspended from December 1 through March 31. During that time, place small amounts of brush in your green garbage container or place larger amounts in 45-gallon containers (or tied & bundled) curbside with your bulk collection.

**REMINDER:** PLASTIC BAGS <u>ARE NOT</u> RECYCLABLE. Plastic bags used to hold shredded paper should be included with your regular household garbage.

All recycled items must be loose inside the blue recycling

carts. Permitted recyclable items include glass (bottles & jar), aluminum (cans), tin (cans), plastic (milk containers, plastic soda bottles, juice, water bottles, bleach, laundry detergent and such), newspapers, mixed papers (magazines, mail, office paper, school paper) & cardboard.

# Volunteers Help Make Ocean a Healthy and Caring Community

The Department of Human Services, located at 601 Deal Road in the large white house at the end of the road behind the library and museum, provides senior services, mental health counseling, before and after-school childcare, recreational facilities and recreation programs for the residents of Ocean.

These vital programs could not exist without dedicated volunteers who support them. Every weekday, volunteer drivers deliver nutritious meals to approximately 35 homebound seniors through the Meals on Wheels program. These dedicated drivers deliver not only food, but provide a friendly visit and a warm smile to our neighbors who are often isolated and alone.

The annual Thanksgiving Food Drive and Adopt a Family program are managed by the Community Hope Fund and the Human Services Department. But the success of these efforts lies in the volunteers who donate food and holiday gifts and sort and deliver food for Thanksgiving food baskets. These generous volunteers ensure that families in need in our community are remembered during the holiday season. Last year, 115 Ocean families received Thanksgiving food baskets and 39 families received holiday gifts.

Hundreds of young people participate in youth recreation basketball and soccer every year. These programs couldn't exist without those who give their time to mentor our youth and teach them about sports and sportsmanship.

Last year, nearly 200 people served as volunteers in our youth sports programs. Volunteer coaches are an integral part of our recreation program. Their support keeps our programs operating and affordable for all.

# 2019 Election Voting and Registration Schedule & Guide



General Election and School Board Election: Tues., Nov. 5 - 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Registration deadline: Tues., Oct. 15

Absentee voter deadlines: Application by mail – Tues.., Oct. 29 Application in person – Mon., Nov. 4

The November 5 election ballot will include the following three municipal, non-binding referendum questions for Township of Ocean voters:

- 1. Should the Township of Ocean adopt a deer management policy? YES or NO
- 2. If the Township of Ocean adopts a deer management policy, choose one of the three options:
- 1. The policy should include lethal methods only.
- 2. The policy should include non-lethal methods only.
- 3. The policy should include lethal and non-lethal methods.
- 3. Should the Township of Ocean allow medical marijuana dispensaries to operate within the Township of Ocean limits?

# Don't be Angry; Be Informed

Place garbage and recycling carts, as well as bulk items and metal, to the curb after 6:00 p.m. the night before your pick up or by 6:00 a.m. the morning of collection. And remove carts, etc. from the roadway by 6:00 a.m. of the morning following collection.

**Storm Drains:** Keep leaves and other objects off the roadways and out of the storm drains to prevent them from becoming decay in waterways.

Be sure to clean your **pet's waste** from any public property or any others' private property.

Homeowners and businesses are required to register/ renew their alarm/security systems with the Township of Ocean Police Department annually.
