

## *Changes to the Township's Solid Waste Collection To Begin in January*

The Township will implement its automated garbage collection system on January 3, 2011. This simplified program will provide once-per-week, same-day collection of garbage and recycling. Therefore, if your designated collection day is Tuesday, you will receive both garbage and recycling pick-up on that day only. In addition, bulk items will be collected once a month and metal items will be collected once a quarter.

In early December, two 95-gallon carts will be delivered to each residence – one for household garbage and one for single stream recycling. Single stream recycling will allow residents to place all recyclable materials (including glass, paper, aluminum, tin, cardboard and chipboard) in a single container. Also, residents may continue to place small amounts of brush and garden debris (not leaves or grass clippings) in with their household garbage. An additional garbage cart will be available for lease, if needed.

The transition to once a week automated collection will reduce personnel costs by over \$400,000 per year once it is fully implemented. This savings is critical as the Township prepares for the newly imposed 2% property tax levy cap, which will take effect with the 2011 budget.

In addition to providing significant cost savings, the automated collection system will enhance recycling compliance by offering more frequent collections and allowing residents to combine all recyclable materials in a single container. Also, the larger containers will more easily allow residents to dispose of small amounts of brush with their regular household garbage. Eliminating the presence of small piles of brush material on the roadways will help reduce the clogging of storm drains and improve the overall appearance of the community.

## *Proposed Bicycle and Pedestrian Transportation Network*

In late 2009, the Township was approached by a group of local residents who were interested in pursuing a greenway project that would provide a safe, reliable and accessible transportation network for pedestrians and bicyclists. The purpose of the project was to create walking and biking paths that would link key locations throughout the Township such as parks, schools, places of worship, governmental offices, and business districts. It is very common for local residents to drive their car to a nearby park to play tennis, take a walk, or enjoy an athletic event. The proposed greenway project would expand and enhance these recreational experiences by enabling residents to safely and comfortably walk or bike to the local park rather than drive. It would also allow more children to walk or bike to school, to the library, or to the pool complex.

This original greenway concept has evolved into what is now being referred to as an “Active Transit Network” and has generated interest from a number of entities including the school district, the Environmental Commission, local businesses, the Monmouth County Planning Board, and Monmouth University. In addition, in the Spring of 2010 the New Jersey Department of Transportation – Office of Bicycle and Pedestrian Programs awarded a grant to the Township to assist in planning the Active Transit Network. The planning process started in early May and the first public informational session on the project was held on August 19 at Town Hall.

Registration for the fall cycle of programs will begin **Wednesday, September 8th** for Township of Ocean residents and will be accepted on-line (using credit card payments) through CommunityPass, our new on-line registration service. Non-residents may register as per the non-resident dates indicated in the brochure found on-line.

It is strongly suggested that our residents avoid waiting in line and take advantage of the on-line registration procedure. However, in person registration will be accepted on September 8 at the **Department of Human Services**, 601 Deal Rd. beginning @ 8:30 a.m. Staff will register walk-ins, in the order in which they are received, using the on-line program. Registrants are expected to remain on site until the process is completed. Registration forms/fees received by mail on September 8 will be processed in a random order throughout the day. Registration forms/fees received by mail prior to September 8 will go unprocessed and will be considered for processing as of September 9.

**Senior Transportation/Services:** Specific information in regard to transportation services available to residents 62 years and older may also be found in the on-line brochure. Trips to the Monmouth Mall, Ocean Township Library, and grocery stores are scheduled as is transportation services for doctor's appointments.



# Recycling & Collections Guide - Fall/ Winter 2010

## RECYCLING & BULK COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Ocean Township Sanitation Department collects all recyclables, bottles, glass, plastic, tin, aluminum, newspaper, mixed paper, cardboard and bulk trash on selected Wednesdays.

### GARBAGE AND RECYCLING COLLECTION SCHEDULES WILL BE CHANGING JANUARY 3, 2011. WATCH FOR ANNOUNCEMENTS

If your household garbage is collected on **Monday & Thursday**, recyclables and bulk trash will be collected on the **first and third Wednesday of each month**

If your household garbage is collected on **Tuesday and Friday**, recyclables and bulk trash will be collected on the **second and fourth Wednesday of each month.**

If your household garbage is collected by the **smaller estate truck**, please call for schedule.

**Metal is collected on the 5th Wednesday of the month-refer to Metal & Appliances**

All recyclables, bulk trash, metal and garbage must be placed at the curb line **AFTER 6:00 PM** the day before collection or **BEFORE 6:00 AM** the day of collection.

Empty garbage cans must be removed from the curb by 8:00 AM the day after collection.

## RECYCLING COLLECTION SCHEDULES WILL BE CHANGING JANUARY 3, 2011 WATCH FOR ANNOUNCEMENTS

**COMINGLED:** Aluminum Cans Tin Cans Glass Bottles & Jars

**Plastic Bottles** Symbols are located on the bottom of the container: symbols #1- with screw tops only, #2-narrow neck containers (milk, water, soda, detergent, shampoo); Narrow and screw top containers with symbols #3, #4, #5, #6, & #7.

Remove caps from all bottles.

**PAPER:** Newspapers and inserts, magazines, catalogs, cereal boxes, telephone books, printer and copier paper, mail and all other office papers without wax liners, corrugated cardboard, tissue, cookie, pasta, & cracker boxes, greeting cards, paper towel & toilet paper cores.

**HOW: Co-mingled:** Rinse all containers, place at the curb line in an uncovered garbage can, no larger than 45 gallons; weight limit: 50 pounds

**Paper:** Place **ALL** paper in an uncovered plastic bin with a weight on top, 45 gallon garbage can or securely tied into bundles. There is a 50 pound limit on each container/bundle. Cardboard may be flattened and tied. **Do NOT place items in bags!** Only Shredded paper must be set out in sealed **clear plastic bags** with paper.

**NOT RECYCLABLE, place in regular garbage:**

**Glass** - dishes, drinking glasses, ceramics, mirrors, light bulbs, ovenware (Pyrex), windows and clay pots.

**Aluminum** - pie plates, kitchen pots and pans, foil and baking pans:

**Tin** - paint cans, aerosol cans, kitchen pots and pans:

**Plastic** - flower pots, margarine tubs, salad trays, baby wipe tubs, Tupper ware-type containers, sour cream and yogurt containers, any Styrofoam products, flash lights or any containers that have held motor oil or antifreeze.

**Paper** - carbon paper, blueprints, plastic or wax coated paper, paper towels, paper napkins, tissues, food contaminated paper (ex: pizza boxes.)

Township will pick up these items curbside **by appointment**. The collection dates are: September 29 and December 29, 2010. Residents must call 732-531-5000, ext. 362 or 363 to placed on pick up list. **2011 Collection dates will be announced shortly.**

Large metal items include swing sets, lawn furniture, bikes, lawn mowers (remove gas, oil & spark plug), tire rims, cabinets, shelving and fencing. Pieces must not be longer than 4 ft. in length. All metal must be free of concrete. Small metal items like curtain rods and toaster ovens should be set out with garbage. Refer to **GARBAGE**.

**DO NOT** place any material at the curb line until 6 PM the night before your scheduled pick up date **Refrigerators, Freezers, AC units, dehumidifiers & water coolers must be free of Freon. Federal regulations require residents to supply certification that Freon has been removed before appointment for collection can be made.**

**PROPANE TANKS and HELIUM TANKS are not picked up by the Township.** Refer to **HAZARDOUS WASTE**.

<p><b>HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES</b></p> 	<p><b>WHAT:</b> Rechargeable and button batteries from watches, hearing aids, stereo etc, must be separated from household trash and disposed of at a proper recycling center. Household Batteries, C, D, AA, etc. are now disposed of with regular garbage <b>No Automotive or Equipment Batteries.</b></p>
<p><b>HAZARDOUS WASTE</b></p> 	<p>Monmouth County has a permanent <b>Household Hazardous Waste Facility</b>. Residents may bring household hazardous waste to this facility located at 3211 Shafto Rd. Tinton Falls <b>An appointment must be made prior to bringing material to the facility.</b> Call 732-922-2234 to schedule an appointment.</p>
<p><b>HOUSEHOLD GARBAGE</b></p> 	<p><b>WHAT:</b> Garbage consists of material that originates from the kitchen, bed, or bathrooms; for example: Clothes, toys, flower pots, tissues, paper towels, food waste, pots &amp; pans, toaster ovens, curtain rods and light bulbs (<b>excluding fluorescent bulbs SEE HAZARDOUS WASTE</b>).</p> <p><b>HOW:</b> Maximum garbage can size is 45 gallons at the curb line, no more than 50 pounds per can.</p> <p><b>WHEN:</b> Garbage is picked up every Monday &amp; Thursday or Tuesday &amp; Friday. 45 gallon containers may be used for curbside collection only. Up to three 45 gallon containers of brush should be placed out for collection with household garbage. <i>All garbage must be placed at the curb line if you have more than five (5) 36-gallon cans.</i></p> <p><b><i>AUTOMATED GARBAGE AND RECYCLING COLLECTIONS WILL BEGIN JANUARY 3, 2011 WATCH FOR ANNOUNCEMENTS</i></b></p>
<p><b>PAINT &amp; PAINT CANS</b></p> 	<p><b>EMPTY</b> and <b>dried paint cans</b> should be disposed of with regular garbage. <b>SMALL</b> amounts of paint (one inch or less) can be handled by removing the lid and allowing the liquid to dry. Adding crumbled newspaper helps paint dry faster. Paint hardened cans may be treated as empty paint cans.</p> <p><b>Oil based</b> paints and full cans of water based paint must be taken to the County -sponsored Household Hazardous Waste Facility (<b>SEE HAZARDOUS WASTE</b>) or donate the paint to non-profit groups or schools.</p>
<p><b>BULK TRASH &amp; WOOD</b></p> 	<p><b>WHAT:</b> Bulk trash includes: furniture, computers, televisions, wooden desks, mattresses &amp; box springs, mirrors, plastic lawn furniture, microwave ovens, windows, tires (no rims), and other large items.</p> <p><b>HOW:</b> Wood/lumber: Set out in 45 gallon containers or tied and bundled -50 pound limit, stockade fencing may be cut in 4x4 sections and neatly stacked. Carpet &amp; padding must be rolled &amp; tied and no longer than 4' long, 18" in diameter; large metal items such as appliances, lawn furniture, and bikes are picked up with <b>metal pickup</b>. Refer to <b>METAL AND APPLIANCES</b>.</p> <p>Construction material (sheet rock, floor tile, etc) - Three 45 gallon cans, Max. 50 pounds. Nails must be removed or hammered down. Maximum length of wood = 4 feet.</p> <p><b>WHEN:</b> See schedule on page one.</p> <p><b>Contractor generated material is prohibited from municipal collection. Call for recycling electronics information</b></p> <p><b><i>BULK TRASH COLLECTION SCHEDULES WILL CHANGE BEGINNING JANUARY 3, 2011; WATCH FOR INFORMATION</i></b></p>
<p><b>ASPHALT SHINGLES</b></p> 	<p>The Township will pick up small amounts of asphalt shingles with <b>BULK TRASH</b>. They must be in a garbage can no larger than 45 gallon in size, 50 pound limit on each garbage can AND a limit of two garbage cans per <b>bulk trash</b> pickup. Shingles must be free of nails.</p>
<p><b>TIRES</b></p>	<p>Up to three (3) <b>RIMLESS</b> tires are picked up on bulk trash day . Metal tire rims are picked up with metal, refer to <b>METAL AND APPLIANCES</b></p>
<p><b>CONCRETE &amp; BRICK</b></p> 	<p>The Township will pick up these materials curbside. Residents must call to be placed on the pick up list. Call 732-531-5000, ext. 362 or 363. You will be given further instructions at that time. Limit of one (1) cubic yard or equivalent of three (3) 45 gallon garbage cans. Keep the different types of materials separated from each other. Place loose at the curb in a manner not to create a traffic hazard - no more than 3 ft. from the curb.</p> <p><b>Material must be placed at least 10 feet away from a storm drain inlet</b> <b>Contractor generated material is prohibited from municipal collection.</b></p>
<p><b>APARTMENTS</b></p>	<p>By law, apartments must recycle the same items as single family dwellings. Check with your Management to find out where drop off areas are and when collection service is offered.</p>

<p><b>MOTOR OIL, ANTIFREEZE, CAR BATTERIES</b></p> 	<p>These materials <b>MUST</b> be brought to the Monmouth County Household Hazardous Waste Facility See <b>HAZARDOUS WASTE</b>.</p> <p>Full service gas stations are required by law to accept used motor oil. Oil must be free of contaminants. Car batteries should be taken to a scrap yard where you can usually receive money for them. Local scrap yards are listed in the Yellow Pages.</p>
<p><b>LEAVES</b></p> 	<p>Leaf Collections are made according to the <b>SCHEDULE</b> in this newsletter (See next page). Place leaves <b>LOOSE</b> in piles at the curb line, taking care not to create a traffic hazard. Piles can be no wider than 5 ft. from the curb line into the street.</p> <p><i>Leaves must be placed at the curb ten days before scheduled pickup times. Leaves must not be placed in the street May through September. DO NOT</i> place leaves in or next to storm drains. Leaf piles must be placed at least 10 feet away from a storm drain inlet (per the NJ Storm water Regulations) or you may be subject to a summons.</p> <p><b>Leaf piles must be free of all branches, brush, grass, weeds, old plants, pine needles, garbage and debris. Bagged leaves will not be picked up.</b></p>
<p><b>GRASS</b></p>	<p>The Township <b>WILL NOT</b> pick up grass at any time. Anyone placing cut grass, loose sod, dirt in the gutter, curbside or in storm drains is subject to a summons. Residents may bring their grass, free of charge, to the recycling center located at the west end of Sunset Ave. <u>Professional Gardeners / Landscapers must pay</u> an annual fee of \$300 per vehicle. Turf Specialists recommend grass clippings be left on the lawn or used for composting.</p>
<p><b>BRUSH AND BRANCHES</b></p> 	<p>November through March <b>do not place loose brush curbside; brush is now to be placed in no more than 3- 45 gallon containers, 50 lbs or less, and may be set out with regular garbage.</b> Loose brush will be collected by zone from April through October; see schedule on next page. Place loose curbside in lengths up to 4 feet; piles not to exceed 3 feet in height and not to extend more than 4 feet into the road. Brush must be placed at least 10 feet away from storm drains. Emergency collections will made following storms. <b>DO NOT</b> place other debris such as garbage, weeds, flowers, or leaves with the branches and brush.</p>
<p><b>WEEDS, PLANTS, SOIL</b></p> 	<p>Place weeds, plants, and other vegetation from garden and flower beds, in no more than 2—45 gallon containers; 1-5 gallon container for soil, weighing no more than 50 pounds. Set the containers out with your <b>GARBAGE</b> at the curb on pickup day <b>OR Try composting! This is a great way to recycle leaves, kitchen waste and other organic materials. Compost bins are sold by the Township for \$35. Please call 732-531-5000, ext 364 additional information.</b></p>
<p><b>RECYCLING DROP OFF CENTER</b></p> 	<p>The Recycling Drop Off Center is located at the west end of Sunset Ave. at the Public Works Garage. Direct all questions to the Public Works office at the municipal building during regular business hours.  <b>The Center is open from 7:30 AM to 2:30 PM, Monday thru Friday (except holidays). From April 15 thru September 30, the Drop Off Center is open on weekends from 2PM-5PM and Tuesday and Thursday from 5PM – 8PM.</b></p> <p><b>PUBLIC WORKS YARD IS NOW MONITORED BY SECURITY CAMERAS</b>  <b>NOTICE: Improper disposal of any material (such as: paint, oil, car batteries, tires, garbage, wood, leaves, brush, lawn furniture, electronics, items containing Freon etc. in the dumpster area will be treated as illegal dumping subject to fines. Violators will be issued a summons to appear in Municipal Court</b></p> <p>The following materials are accepted at the Drop Off Center. Please place the material in the appropriate area / dumpster. Do not place any bags in the dumpsters, use the receptacles provided.  <b>CARDBOARD:</b> Boxes should be free of any debris or wax coatings and <b>FLATTENED</b>. Up to 15 small to medium boxes are accepted per week.  <b>PAPER BAGS:</b> Brown paper bags can be placed with the corrugated boxes.  <b>COMMINGLED BOTTLES AND CANS:</b> Clean commingled glass, aluminum, tin and plastic containers are accepted. Limited to one (1) 45 gallon container .  <b>NEWSPAPER &amp; MIXED PAPER:</b> Two (2) 45 gallon containers of clean paper, free of debris, must be placed in dumpsters.  <b>GRASS:</b> Dump loose grass, free of debris such as leaves, branches or garbage, in the “GRASS” dumpsters.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>Please place empty plastic bags in receptacles provided, not in the dumpsters.  Grass is accepted April 15 thru November 30.</b></p>


# Brush Collection

# 2010 Fall - Winter Leaf Collection Schedule

October 1 through April 30 loose brush will not be collected and may not be placed in the street. Residents are required to put small amounts of brush material such as small branches, hedge and shrub clippings in regular garbage containers and place them out for regular garbage collection. Small amounts have been determined to be that which can fit into three or less 45 gallon containers.

This collection practice will change with the implementation of Automated Collection.

Township Ordinance, Chapter X and NJ DEP mandate leaves may only be placed at the curb 10 business days prior to the scheduled pick-up dates. The Township will not collect leaves if mixed with brush, limbs, grass, trash or other debris. Leaves placed out during pick up week may not be collected.

**Leaf piles must be placed at least 10 feet from any storm drain inlet.**

**Homeowners are responsible for notifying lawn care specialists/landscapers of leaf and brush collection schedules**

# Solutions To Stormwater Pollution

## Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

### A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water and that's why we're all doing something about it. By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

**Properly use and dispose of hazardous products.** Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints. Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local water bodies and the water is not treated. If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store and dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance. Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible. Recycle used motor oil. Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous waste disposal facilities.

**Limit use of fertilizers and pesticides.** Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer. Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted. Look into alternatives for pesticides. Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer. If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.

**Don't litter.** Place trash in receptacles; Recycle; Recycle, Recycle; Participate in community clean ups.

**Don't feed wildlife.** Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks or geese in public areas. Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.

**Keep pollution out of storm drains.** Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local water bodies. Do not let sewerage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

**Clean up after your pet.** Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet waste rules. An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property. Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law & remember to:

1. Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes;
2. Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet;
3. Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

**Dispose of yard waste properly:** Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains; If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them; use leaves and grass clipping as a resource for compost; Use a mulching lawn mower
